

Henry County Health Center achieves accreditation with ACHC

Henry County Health Center is pleased to have received approval of accreditation status by Accreditation Commission for Health Care (ACHC) for the services of HCHC's Sleep Lab.

Achieving accreditation is a process where healthcare organizations demonstrate compliance with national standards. Accreditation by ACHC reflects an organization's dedication and commitment to meeting standards that facilitate a higher level of performance and patient care.

"The successful accreditation status by Accreditation Commission for Health Care (ACHC) of our sleep lab serves as confirmation of our outstanding practice. Our community and our patients can be confident that their sleep health needs are being met by a facility and staff who have been certified by an independent organization ensuring that HCHC meets those prescribed standards," commented Devan Rhum, Director of Specialty Services. "We have worked hard to attain this certification and we will continue to follow the high standards to maintain our certified status."

Sleep Studies at HCHC

HCHC's medical team can effectively diagnose and treat sleep problems at HCHC's Sleep Diagnostic Lab. For individuals who think they might have a sleep disorder, they should first consult with their primary care physician, who will take a medical history and may do a physical exam. If necessary, a sleep study is done.

A sleep study is performed during normal sleep hours. A quiet, comfortable room free of distractions is provided. Before patients go to sleep, electrodes are attached to the face, scalp, chest and legs continued on page 4



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HCHC offers 3-D mammography

Early detection is the best protection against breast cancer. October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month and HCHC patients receive advanced breast imaging with HCHC's 3-D mammography.

Breast tomosynthesis, often referred to as 3-D mammography, allows doctors to see masses and distortions associated with cancers and precancerous cells significantly more clearly than conventional 2-D mammography. Fine details are more visible with 3-D imaging and no longer hidden by the surrounding tissue. With 3-D mammography, more images per exposure are acquired giving the radiologist more information and the ability to see finer details.

Studies have shown that 3-D mammograms result in the following benefits for patients: 30-35 percent increase in cancer detection; 11 percent decrease in biopsy rate; an approximate 40 percent reduction in recall rates; 40-50 percent increase in invasive cancer detection.

In addition, 3-D mammography has superior diagnostic accuracy for all breast types. Very low x-ray energy is used during exams, with the total patient dose being well within the FDA safety standards for mammography.

HCHC's mammography technicians are specifically trained in this imaging. In addition to offering cutting-edge 3-D mammography, HCHC's Women's Center provides a private and comfortable waiting area with direct entry to mammography, bone density and ultrasound testing.

Do opinions really count on surveys? At Henry County Health Center the answer is yes!

HCHC wants to ensure that we provide quality healthcare and customer service that our patients expect and deserve. A key way to hear our customers is through patient satisfaction surveys.

HCHC has transitioned to the patient satisfaction survey company, Press Ganey, to assess patient satisfaction. Patients will notice shorter surveys, email surveys for outpatient testing and Emergency Department patients, as well as patient surveys for Physicians & Clinics which includes Women's Health Services, Orthopedics, General Surgery and the Winfield & Wayland Community Clinics. HCHC now also has the ability to survey Park Place elders.

"The survey measures our patients' experience while receiving services at HCHC. We send surveys to a percentage of patients who received outpatient testing and Emergency

Department services. All patients in Maternity Services, Inpatient Medical/Surgical Services and outpatient surgery receive a survey as well," explained Sue McBride, HCHC's Patient Representative/Risk Management nurse.

Patient feedback key to success

Patients receive surveys about two weeks after the time of service, and the survey results are returned to HCHC in reports so that department leaders can analyze the data. The survey results are anonymous; however, patients who would like to have the hospital contact them can provide their name and phone number.

"We want our patients to receive quality care, to be educated about their medical options, and to be treated with courtesy and respect," said McBride. "Listening to our patients' feedback is our most important way to know

All of the information from the study is evaluated by a physician trained in sleep disorders. The physician will be able to diagnose a disorder and recommend treatment.


